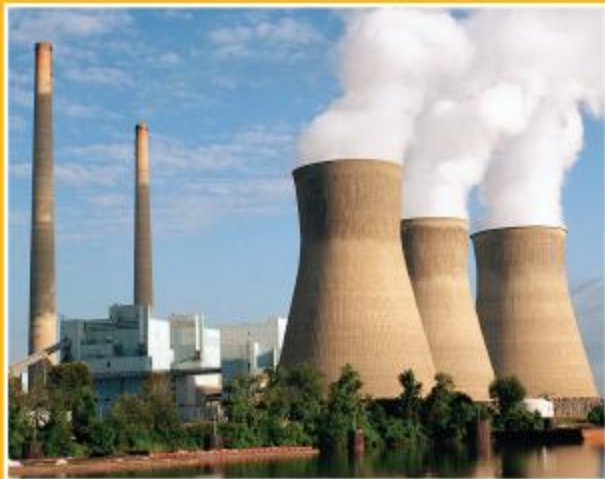

Jobs Survey for 2010

- Property that was mined prior to the 1977 Surface Mining and Reclamation Control Act.
- Property which was permitted post 1977 with the post mine land use included in the permitting process
- Property that was fully reclaimed and then used for development
- Property that was mined but had incidental coal therefore did not have a mining permit

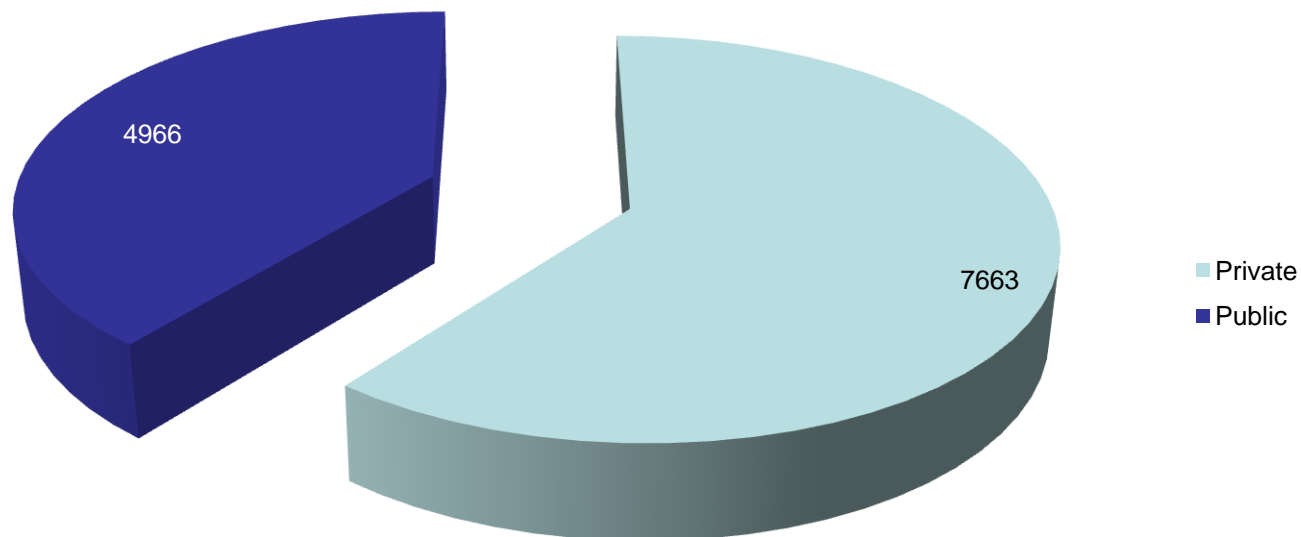
Things to Note:

- **These are fluid numbers, the Office of Coalfield will continue to monitor for changes in job numbers as well as the addition of sites that are not included in this survey**
- **This includes sites that have had prior mining activity. This includes sites with a designated post mine land use in the permit, properties mined prior to 1977 and projects where a permit was not needed due to incidental coal**
- **Jobs encompass all known jobs on sites including public and private employees, full time, part time and seasonal employees and construction employees. These numbers include what are considered direct and indirect employment in terms of economic development and a job multiplier should not be used for economic impact studies**

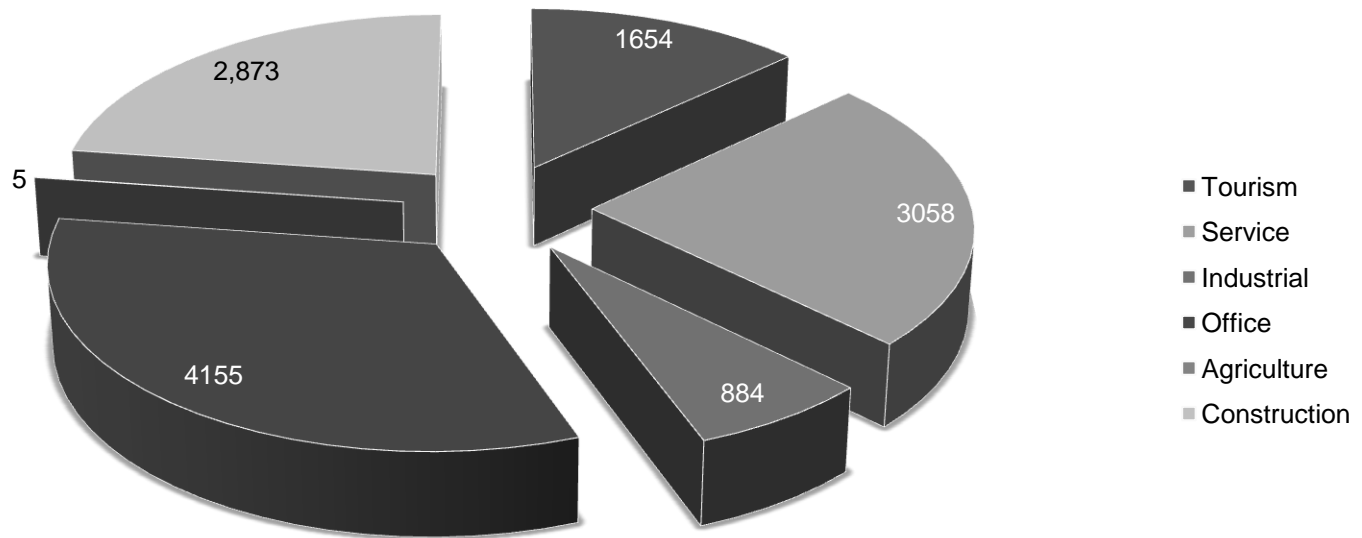

Key Findings

- Impact of the FBI Center along I 79
- Similar activity with the Boy Scout Project along US 19
- Lack of use of current infrastructure from mining
- Use of AML funding

Action Items For the Office from the Survey

- Work with the Corridor G Regional Development Authority as well as the county development authorities of Lincoln, Boone, Logan, and Mingo to recruit, expand or create an economic development project that will create direct employment opportunities in that region.
- Work with county development authorities who have current mining operation which have large investments in infrastructure and buildings to ensure those resources are protected from destruction post mining.
- Market renewable energy opportunities mentioned above plus the ability to sell these energies into other states portfolios.
- Work with the West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection to study the Bechtel reserve to see what other development opportunities could be fostered through abandon mine land monies
